Prepare the Way of the Lord  
Matthew 3:3

**Who should come?** Congregational leaders (including clergy) both newly elected or currently serving and young (including youth) and old. Until the 1<sup>st</sup> of August, attendance will be limited to Winchester District and following that, it will be opened to Arlington and Alexandria District.

**What is the training?** The training is Bible study emphasizing Matthew 5:1-8 (The Beatitudes). The training is designed less to give techniques for solving contemporary leadership problems and more toward developing the servant leadership style and attitude depicted by Christ. There will be eight talks (concerning aspects of the beatitudes) and discussion following each talk.

**Biblical Dramatizations.** Interspersed among the talks are some dramatizations brought to us by the Reverend Al Horton (well-known across the conference for his moving portrayals of Biblical personalities).

**When is the training?** Saturday, August 23<sup>rd</sup> from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Lunch and dinner are included in the \$25 fee.

**Where is the training?** Bethel UMC just outside of Warrenton. From the Winchester area, come east on Interstate 66 to exit 28 toward Warrenton (Route 17 South). From exit 28, go 7.4 miles to Route 628 where you turn left. About one half mile up Route 628, Bethel Church is on the right. # Highlights from Annual Conference

A Service of Remembrance and Holy Communion was the first service of the 226th session of the Virginia Annual Conference, meeting in the Roanoke Civic Center, June 15-18. The Rev. J.P. Hong, senior pastor of Culmore UMC, Arlington District, welcomed the gathering and was the liturgist for the service. The Rappahannock District Youth Choir, under the direction of Aaron Ward, provided special music. The theme of this year's conference is "Let's get growing! More people, more young people, more diverse people. All for Jesus!" with the emphasis this year on more *young* people.



The Rev. Amanda Miller Garber, director of the Wesley Foundation at James Madison University, was the preacher. She based her sermon on Philippians 3:14.



The Rev. Bob Blinn, conference secretary, led the "Naming of The Honored Dead." As each name was read aloud, a bell tolled and a candle was lit.

Bishop Charlene Kammerer led by the service of Holy Communion which was served to all those in attendance.

The Virginia Annual Conference session opened **Monday morning** with the Laity Session while the clergy met in their own session.

The Laity Session was led by Shirley Cauffman, conference lay leader. She told about the many programs in which laity are involved.



Bishop Joe Pennel, former Virginia Conference bishop, led the morning Bible studies and preached the closing sermon.



Bishop Kammerer welcomed conference members by saying "The warmest of welcomes to all of you. This year we should all know that we are focusing on youth and young adult voices, witnesses and presence."

Rachel Smith, who was attending her first annual conference, along with Dr. George Lightner, attending his 74<sup>th</sup> consecutive annual conference, led the opening prayer. George is 99 years young this year" the bishop said.



On **Monday afternoon**, The Rev. Marc Brown presented a video to open the All Things New, Fruitful and Multiplying report, a plan to open and revitalize churches throughout the conference.



Bishop Hope Morgan Ward, resident bishop of the Mississippi Conference, brought the afternoon message.

Fourteen year-old Elizabeth Cumbest, also from Mississippi, shared songs of praise to God which she was moved to write after Hurricane Katrina.

With electric guitars, drums, and keyboard, the band *Crave* from Asbury UMC, Harrisonburg, provided a "rock-and-roll" sound during the ordination processional on **Monday evening**.

During her sermon based on Matthew 9:35-38 and entitled "The Lord of the Harvest", Bishop Kammerer said "Everyone here for ordination has heard a deep calling from God. Jesus has promised a bountiful harvest. "



The bishop's sermon was followed by the licensing of the local pastors (31 persons), the recognition of an associate member (one person), the commissioning of the probationary members (22 persons), and the ordaining of elders (23 persons).

**Tuesday morning** opened with a Bible study led by former Virginia Conference Bishop, Joe Pennel.

Shawn Bakker of the *Advance* presented the conference with an award for having raised more money than any other conference in the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The Virginia Conference ranks number two in the United States in *Advance* giving.

Shirley Cauffman then took the stage to present the Laity Address. She asked people to think of the "What ifs" of the church. For example, "What if the church truly became a place of open hearts, open minds, and open doors?"

Addie Haynes, president of the Conference United Methodist Women, reported on the activities of the women's groups throughout Virginia. The Virginia Conference women are second in the nation in giving.



Larry Burian, president of the conference United Methodist Men, presented his report. This year, United Methodist Men are celebrating 100 years of ministry. There are more chartered UMM units in Virginia than any other conference.



Also on **Tuesday morning**, Marshall Bailey, president of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, thanked the conference for making this year's conference emphasis on youth and young adults. Bailey

then introduced a video that shows how youth are engaged in ministry.

**Bishop Hope Morgan Ward** took the stage at 11:15 in her role of conference preacher. She talked about her grandmother who died when she was only 7, but has a presence in her life to this day. She thanked Bishop Kammerer for her friendship and love.

**Tuesday afternoon** started with a dramatic musical presentation by the youth, followed by a Bible study by Bishop Pennel.

The Rev. Thomas Lee was introduced for the **Kits for Conference** dedication. The members celebrated the fact that monetary donations of \$74,920.61 was collected along with:

The total monetary value placed on kits and donations comes to \$598,820.61

The 2008 retirees made their way to the stage for "**A New Commission: Ministry in Retirement.**" Dr. Susan Garrett gave the sermon as she retires from her position as Director of Connectional Ministries for the Virginia Conference.



Both young and old enjoyed the Keith Elgin Band of Christ Church in Fairfax Station as they kicked off the **Tuesday evening** session.

The worship service was planned by eight young clergy and certified professionals of the conference. Marianne Brown greeted the gathering and called the faithful to worship. Carl Perez read the Scripture using Genesis 1:27, 2:18, 2:22 Newly-ordained elder Chris Bennett from the Winchester District brought the message.



Jeanne Torrence Finley of the Board of Church and Society presented Resolution 1 in regard to the "Restoration of Voting Rights." The resolution passed as amended.

Beth Givens, representing the Committee on Resolutions, presented Resolution 2, "A Call for Prison Accountability." The resolution passed as amended.

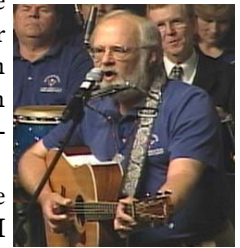

**Wednesday morning** opened with special music from the Sonlight Youth Choir Band from Trinity UMC, Gainesville, Fla.

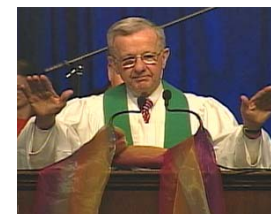
